



Dear student,

We hope this newsletter meets you well. We hope that you're looking forward to Welcome and joining us here in the Department of Sociology.

A number of you have been in contact regarding your upcoming course selection so we thought it would be beneficial to provide you with some important information now regarding course selection and the availability of courses for 2024/2025. There is a full PG course selection guide available that we encourage you to read before arriving in September, but we have also set out a lot of key information below. Every year, we aim to offer you learning opportunities across a varied range of topics that are empirically rich and intellectually stimulating. Each MSc programme will have compulsory and optional courses available to select from in line with the programme regulations – all students are expected to adhere to their programme regulations, which set out exactly which courses you may select from. Courses can be either worth half (0.5) or a full (1.0) unit. A full unit course is taught across both the Autumn (first) Term and Winter (second) term whilst a half unit course runs for just one term. All our MSc programmes will also require you to undertake a 10,000-word dissertation. A full-time student would be required to select courses to the value of four full units. A part-time student would usually be required to select courses up to the value of two units in their first year, and two units (including the dissertation) in their second year.

The course guide for each course will include an overview of the course and topics covered, the teaching hours involved, the teaching format, and the assessment method(s). The course guides are due to be published week commencing 12 August, and will detail the outline of the course, who the course is open to, the assessments and any other teaching related information.

All Sociology option courses are 'Controlled Access' which means the Department decides which students will be accepted onto their courses. This may be due to limited available spaces or prerequisites that need to be checked. All students are required to submit a short, written statement explaining why they wish to take that course and how it fits their research interests. **It is important to note that all courses are subject to availability, and you are not guaranteed a space unless it is a compulsory course for your programme. This means you**

might not get a place on your first-choice courses, and you are encouraged to have alternative courses in mind.

You will have the opportunity to consult with your programme director or academic mentor during Welcome to make informed decisions regarding your course selection. Before the formal course selection window opens, there will be a short period where the course selection system will open for browsing only, so you can have some time to get familiar with the system.

We will release even more detailed guidance closer to your arrival in September and we hope this newsletter has covered your general queries for now. In the meantime, below are all the courses due to be taught by the Department of Sociology in 2024/25, barring any unforeseen circumstances that may lead to changes.

Please note that the below list includes all our courses running for 2024/25, but you will need to check your programme regulations regarding which ones you are allowed to select:
